


Most Veterans are Over 65 Years Old

A Majority of Today's Veteran Population is Over 65 Years Old




The Majority of Today's Veteran Population Served Prior to the Persian Gulf War


More than Two-Thirds of Today's Veterans Served Prior to the Persian Gulf War



The Vast Majority of Veterans are Men but There Are Generational Differences




A Large Majority of Veterans Across Age Groups are White




More Veterans Identify as Conservative than as Moderate or Liberal

More than 40% of Veterans Identify as Conservative




Younger Generations of Veterans are More Liberal than Older Generations of Veterans

A Majority of Veterans Intend to Vote for Trump in the 2024 Election





Veterans Express Higher Levels of National Pride than Average Americans




Liberal Veterans Express Less National Pride than Conservative and Moderate Veterans



Veterans Grade Service Members Highly but Flag Officers and Commanders in Chief Poorly for their Performance in Iraq and Afghanistan



Most Veterans Think the Military is Headed in the WRONG Direction


A Large Majority of Veterans Think the Military is Heading in the WRONG Direction








Veterans Express More Confidence in the Military than Average Americans





















Veterans Less Likely to Recommend Military Service than in 2019









Veterans Who Say Military Headed in the Right Direction More Likely to Recommend Military Service than Veterans Who Say Military Headed in the Wrong Direction



Veterans With A Great Deal/Fair Amount of Confidence Twice As Likely as Veterans With Not Too Much or No Confidence



as Veterans with Low Levels of National Pride



More than 80% of Those Not Recommeding Service Say Mistrust of Political Leaders is a 'Major Factor' In Their Decision











Personal Development is a Major Factor among Both Liberals and Conservatives





Veterans Overwhelmingly Oppose Racial and Gender Preferences in Military Promotions


Opposition to Racial and Gender Preferences in Military Promotion Decisions is Nearly Universal Among Veterans

Opposition to Racial and Gender Preferences is Strong Across the Political Spectrum



Very Few Veterans Believe the Military Pays 'Too Little' Attention to DEI Efforts







A Plurality of Veterans Think the Military is Becoming Less Meritocratic


More than 40% of Veterans Think the Military Has Become Less Meritocratic Since they Served





A Large Majority of Veterans Say that DEI Efforts Are Not Essential Parts of Warfighting and Are Not Essential for Successful Military Operations







Further Details

- Respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race, and education. The sampling frame is a politically representative "modeled frame" of US adults subset on military veterans, based upon the American Community Survey (ACS) public use microdata file, public voter file records, the 2020 Current Population Survey (CPS) Voting and Registration supplements, the 2020 National Election Pool (NEP) exit poll, and the 2020 CES surveys, including demographics and 2020 presidential vote.
- The matched cases were weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame were combined and a logistic regression was estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function included age, gender, race/ethnicity, years of education, region, and home ownership. The propensity scores were grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post-stratified according to these deciles. The weights were then post-stratified on 2020 presidential vote choice as well as a four-way stratification of gender, age (4-categories), race (4-categories), and education (4-categories), to produce the final weight
